What careers can my subject lead to?

Geography

Studying Geography develops your analytical and communication skills and your ability to evaluate data and all strengths that are in demand in the graduate jobs market. Like other social science graduates, you have a broad range of career paths open to you, though you may be particularly drawn to areas such as environmental planning, health, politics and international relations. Geography students tend to be open-minded and interested in the world around them, qualities which are attractive to employers and may be a particular advantage if you are working for an international organisation.

Specific skills:

- The ability to view problems from a number of angles;
- The ability to write a professional standard document, as well as effective verbal communication;
- The ability to work to deadlines gained from projects and fieldwork;
- The independence gained from working abroad and producing a report in foreign conditions;
- The ability to work in a group gained from fieldwork or project;
- An analytical approach to people and their environment, which means that geographers should also have developed an objective aptitude for management.
