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HeadteacherUpdate

As we approach the end of our Spring Term, it is fantastic to look back and see how much activity, hard work and enjoyment has been packed into such a few short weeks since the new year.

As ever, the usual calendared activities such as Year 13 exams, our regular January whole school exam session, Year 9 Options process and sports fixture programme have taken place, all involving students in key activities that enable them to progress and fulfil their potential. However, I wanted to use this Headteacher's message to highlight a number of significant events and changes that have been introduced this term, and to reflect on the impact they have had on school life and on students.

One of the most significant changes to school life has been the introduction of the 'no mobile phones' policy for Years 7 to 11. With so much media coverage of the concerns over the harm that continual access to mobile phones can have on young people, it is lovely to see the impact of introducing the policy across the school. At lunchtime and break time, there are more students interacting and talking to each other as well as participating in more activities and clubs. Mrs Howells, one of our Deputy Headteachers, recently met with the Pastoral Prefects regarding the policy and received a number of positive feedback points. The students liked the fact that there were fewer opportunities for distractions in lessons and also that at social times there were fear incidents and a reduction in the fear of being photographed or filmed and footage being shared unkindly to others. This step forward is a reflection of the reasons that the policy was introduced. In the Summer Term I will share with you the plan for next Academic Year regarding tutor time each morning. We have recently launched our late gate system and want to remind you that the back gate is locked at 8.40am.

In response to the demand from Year 11 regarding having an indoor space available at lunchtimes, we now have a PlayStation club for Year 11 to which all year groups are allowed to watch in the theatre. During the Summer Term we will launch our first ever PlayStation league to involve all year groups. As the summer approaches, a number of students are counting down the days until they head off to Borneo, for our first World Challenge expedition this Summer. The trip will be challenging and in

preparation students and staff went on their first practice expedition walk this weekend (at the time of writing). Students and staff met at The Discovery Centre, and walked 4km down the Flitch Way, each carrying their back packs and wearing their walking boots. The journey totalled 8km and is building up students' fitness ahead of their jungle trek in Borneo, where they hope to be walking alongside orangutans and pygmy elephants. There are four more walks booked in before they fly to Borneo, and we very much look forward to hearing about their adventures when they return to school in September. Thursday 28 March was also the deadline for our second World Challenge trip to Cambodia which will take place in 2025.

Another highlight of the term took place at the end of January, when we were privileged to welcome Adam Boxer into our school to work with all of our teaching staff. Boxer is a Lead Practitioner for Science at a very successful school in London, as well as the author of a range of books designed at helping teachers in every subject to hone their craft and regular podcaster. He delivered training for our leadership team and middle leaders throughout the day, and then a session for all teaching staff after school to help us to improve and unify the experience of learners in every lesson. Whilst students may not have explicitly noticed the ideas he suggested, the staff have found the adjustments to their teaching have made a world of difference to their understanding of how every student is progressing within the classroom.

As we have continued to develop our wellbeing and mental health offer for students, we have had the privilege of welcoming a whole range of therapy dogs into Notley. Essex Therapy Dogs are a charity that pair up dogs with places such as care homes, hospitals and schools to help bring smiles and relieve tension. Nala, the Newfoundland, has been paired with the school, and she was joined by Coco the German Shephard, Clemmie the Cocker Spaniel, Rosie the Golden Retriever, Rori the Red Setter and Sam the French Bulldog across the week. Our Learning Support area welcomed many visitors who were just 'popping by' while our therapy dogs were in the vicinity! We are planning that this will be replicated in the final exam period in May and June.

Academic interventions have continued the same model as last year but with a few additions, as Period 6s have continued this term, with year 13 joining the timetabled extra sessions as well. These have now officially finished, as we offered another block of 6 weeks to match that in September and October, but some departments are continuing to run sessions up until the exams. Again, the sessions were well attended, with nearly 70% attendance each after school session. Students who were not on the original lists asked to be added, showing a great responsibility for their own learning. Students in both year 11 and 13 have been invited to some Easter revision sessions, and we anticipate they will be as well attended as last year. Certain year 11 students will also be invited to core subject Walking Talking mock exams in the first two weeks of the Summer Term in order to help with the final preparations before beginning their exams properly on 9 May. Equally, two groups of students in year 11 attended concentrated revision sessions at ARU this week in English and Maths to help them understand how to push over the line into the next grade. We hope they found it useful, and we were enormously proud of how well they responded and participated.

Within the sixth form, the final UCAS applications have been made for Year 13 students, who are gradually hearing back from their chosen universities. A particular highlight of the term was hearing that Lucy P in Year 13 has received an offer

from Selwyn College, University of Cambridge, to read Spanish and Italian. This academic achievement is wonderful to celebrate. We were also grateful to Year 12 and 13 students who hosted a number of our Year 11 students for an academic breakfast and an opportunity to discuss the transition to sixth form life. Finally, as Year 13 move towards their examination period and final days of sixth form, I would like to thank the Sixth Form prefect team and subject ambassadors for all their hard work. They have been wonderful representatives for the school at so many events and shown a tremendous amount of dedication and pride in the sixth form, their subjects and in supporting others. We wish them every success in the summer, alongside all of their peers, and in the future.

There is so much more to celebrate about school life, which you will find in the following pages. From the amazing school production, which involved truly impressive number of students in every aspect, to the sixth form participation in the challenges of the MUN and the fun and hard work of the half term ski trip, our students have shown such enthusiasm to get involved and take advantage of all our community has to offer.

I hope you will enjoy this Spring 2024 issue of The Notley News.

It seems just like yesterday that it was the Autumn term, and now Spring has sprung! With the changing seasons, the loom of the formal external examinations is heavy in the air, and there certainly is a sense of importance and rigor amongst our Year 11 and Year 13 students. In order for the school to support anxiety around examinations, the school ran its second year of exam weeks and this has been pivotal in preparing our students for their future GCSE examinations. Governors have been busy in the school talking to students and looking at how the school prepares the students. Students are very complimentary about the exam week, and the Student Council was very clear about how it prepares and supports their confidence in exams. Some students even said that they were excited to sit their examinations.

As part of the Governor role, Governors come into the school and meet with those in charge of key areas and speak also to students. It has been wonderful to see such huge and dramatic improvements in behaviour and the reporting of behaviour. There is a significant decline in students using 'banter' and boisterous behaviour has been recorded by numerous visitors as being almost eradicated. The school is continuing to drive up the standards of behaviour and this is being noted visit after visit after visit. Significantly also, we have had the Grease production, which just show-cased the huge amount of talent here at Notley High School and Braintree Sixth Form. It was simply superb! The arts are also being supported through the school

working towards gaining the Artsmark accreditation – and has seen students being showcased in assemblies for the first time in years. Previously, the school has played music from YouTube and now students walk into live music of such calibre that one could believe themselves to be at an orchestral concert.

As a team of governors, we have been busy attending events, completing monitoring visits such as safeguarding, mental health and wellbeing, pupil premium, SEND and around behaviour and attitudes as well as attending local governance meetings and the schools progress is clear, which was also highlighted in the recent Ofsted report. Years12&13

This term has been a shorter term but a very busy term in the Sixth Form. It has included new content in all A level and BTEC lessons, coursework deadlines, revision, independent study, and a week of mock exams for both year 12 and year 13 students. It will not be long into the next term for the year 12s to sit their second week of exams and for the summer term exam window to begin. There will be several revision sessions over the Easter holidays and an exams skills session for year 13 in the lead up to their exams.

We had 58 university applications submitted by Year 13 students before the January UCAS deadline and students have been receiving offers and selecting their first and insurance choices. Next term will see the start of the UCAS application process for year 12 students, which will include visits to a Higher Education Fair, information about the application process and how to write personal statements. During this term we have had Apprenticeship Week and Careers week. As part of this, and part of our general guidance on progression routes following sixth form, we have had lots of information on apprenticeships and it has been lovely to welcome back several alumni giving talks about progression routes into the Police, Law firms and engineering. They spoke to our students about how they have got to where they are now, and their own experiences. It is always exciting at this point to think about what all our current students might be doing once leaving here and who will come back to share their stories to future students.

As I wrote in one of our weekly bulletins recently, I want to take the opportunity to say thank you to all the sixth form students for making the sixth form a lovely place to work. We are very proud of all our students; they are a big part of making the Sixth Form an excellent place to be. The small things on a daily basis such as the offers of help, smiling and saying hello, small gestures of appreciation and their willingness to engage help to build a friendly and warm environment to be in and to learn in.

I regularly speak to the students about the importance of making their time count and use Mr Potato Head to help emphasise the importance of taking on opportunities that are available to them. The end of this term will see the handover of the prefect roles and subject ambassador roles from our current team to a new team of year 12 students.

The current year 13 prefects and subject ambassadors have been great. They have been dedicated and enthusiastic, they have led meetings, created new initiatives, and helped at many different events interacting with lower school students, prospective students, and parents/carers. We look forward to seeing how the new ambassadors will continue to progress the roles. We would like to say a huge thank you to all the prefects and subject ambassadors and we look forward to finalising the application process and welcoming the new team very shortly.

As we come to the end of this term, we hope that parents/carers and students alike will be rightly proud of what has been achieved so far, as well as seeing what needs to be focused on when we return for the next term, particularly for year 13 students as the exam season will begin.

We refer to the time in Sixth Form as being a journey; although it is a very short journey in time, it is a very important one and rarely one that goes in straight line. We value being part of each student's journey and helping them fulfil their aspirations and setting them on to their next steps, whatever that may be.



The student council have met three times this term, and have discussed how to implement the new mobile phone ban and have been integral in the decisions in its implementation and also the review of how this process is going so far. All students were positive about the removal of the phones, stating that "it will stop a lot of bullying" and that it will improve the quality of teaching and learning as "students will not be on their phones, or thinking about their phones". The council have recognised a noticeable positive change to school and have recognised the positive influence that the new mobile phone ban is having on day to day life.

The council also discussed the exam week, and the impact of the exam week on their readiness for external examinations, and there was a real sense of growing excitement around the forth coming exams as a way to practise these key skills and to showcase their current attainment and progress. After exam week, students found that the whole process had really supported them. Notably also, the students that had previously undertaken exam weeks found the shorter process must much beneficial to them, as it meant more focused revision and focus.

The council have also discussed the need for more activities to happen at break and lunch, and so there is the new PlayStation club for year 11 in Theatre every lunchtime and each year group has been purchased three coloured footballs (linking to their year group colour) which can be used by students

during these times. We are now working towards the further promotion of the many clubs that we have here at Notley High School and Braintree Sixth Form, so that every students realise the vast array of different opportunities on offer at the school. We have everything from chess to handball, to computing club and over 20 sports clubs.

During the council, we also discussed the school's inclusion of the 'Year of Number' and the positive impact that this is having on the school, and the inclusion of numeracy in everyday life. Students gave the leaders of this initiative feedback to help make further improvements on its delivery and to allow further progression and understanding. Students have (each fortnight) taken part in numeracy challenges, and the overall Council feedback has been incredibly complimentary of the impact and implementation of this new innovative strategy.



Borneo World Challenge - 2024

The World Challenge trip to Borneo is on its exciting final legs of preparation. This is the first time that Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form has worked with World Challenge, and this trip was offered to all current year 11 and 12 students. Mr Bridgewater is busy planning the trial expeditions, which will be three separate walks to prepare them for the expedition leg of the journey. The Borneo trip is the Pahu Trial, conservation work and then onto Sepilok and will see students undergo this lifechanging 13 night expedition.

Students are not tourists, but are global citizens and must embrace the diversity and remain to committed to the life long learning that this adventure will bring. When students first arrive, they will touch down in the coastal city of Kota Kinabalu. On the first morning, they will dive into expedition life, and will explore the capital of Sabah, Kota Kinabaly (known locally as KK), this city is a blend of new and old, and is a beautiful bustling city with fiery sunsets. Significant landmarks in this area include the War Memorial, Australia Place, the Jesselton Hotel and the Pillars of Sobah. Students will also experience panoramic views once they climb the 267 steps of the Signal Hill Observatory Tower. By Day 4, students will complete the Pahu Trail Trek, which will last for four days and will see students camping and cooking out in the jungle. Students will follow the river, passing rural villages and paddy fields, they'll also cross streams and hanging bridges: let's hope that they do not look down!.

By day eight, students will be on the exploring Kiulu, a beautiful valley with fruit orchards, paddy fields and thick jungle. It's named after the Tulu plant – a small bamboo that grows on the river banks. Here, students will enjoy a day of snorkelling. Once the adrenalin rush of Kiulu is over, students will then spend four days on their conservation project. They'll travel deeper into Borneo's lush landscape to a village cooperative.

For the next four days they will be living alongside the community, learning how sustainable development supports local livelihoods and protects the environment. They will help out with communityled conservation initiatives, such as wildlife tracking, lake restoration, and tree planting in the orangutan habitats. Their work will make a meaningful contribution to long-term goals. Students get to ask questions, roll up their sleeves, and embrace every opportunity given to them. They will discover the magical life of Sabah's rainforests on a dawn safari along the Kinabatangan River. This teeming ecosystem is one of only two areas in the world that's inhabited by ten species of primate. They get to look out for proboscis monkeys, orangutans, macaques and more. This is a side of Borneo that few tourists see. Rural life can be tough, and they'll have none of the comforts they're used to back home.

Their final full day in Borneo will be in Sepilok. Nothing quite prepares you for Sepilok Orangutan Rehabilitation Centre (SORC). It's one of the few places in the world where you can see orangutans in their natural habitat. These endangered great apes can only be found in the rainforests of Borneo and neighbouring Sumatra. SORC cares for injured orangutans and teaches them how to survive. Feeding time is the best chance of seeing them up close. They will also meet the experts at the pioneering sun bear sanctuary next door. Sun bears play an important role in keeping the forest healthy, but they're threatened by habitat loss and poaching. Students will learn more about the world's smallest bear and what's being done to protect them.

On their final night in Borneo, students will gather for a big team meal.





















Reflections project

Year 9 art students are currently working on a Mini GCSE style Reflections project looking primarily at perfume bottles and glass.

Students have been looking at improving their observational and drawing skills looking at Line, shape, Form and Tone and have experimented with variety of new and exciting techniques.







After a forced hiatus on 4 years thanks to COVID (we had just returned in 2020 when reports of a new mystery virus started circulating), Ski Notley returned to the slopes of Austria in half-term 2024. Only one student had ever been with us before, and she had been in Year 7 in 2020, and one of our instructors had been in Year 11, so this really did feel like Ski Notley: The Next Generation. Ok then – make it so!


The trip started at 2pm on Friday 16 February, when thirty-eight nervous but obviously excited students, four members of staff and two ski instructors were loaded aboard the coach at Notley. After a lot of reorganising the luggage (coach drivers must be amazing at Tetris!), playing musical seats and counting, recounting and re-recounting the students, we waved all the parents and carers goodbye and set off for Dover.

Two hours later the sea appeared, and after stopping to pick up James and Jamie, our two drivers for the week we rolled into the port. The DFDS app made UK border control was a breeze, but we still had to march everyone through French border control. After

the final "Merci" we were back on board the coach just in time to catch the ferry to Dunkirk – in fact we were the last vehicle on. 

All this was followed by tea, instructions for the next day (up at 7am and down from breakfast at 7:30am!) and a relatively early bed.



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




Day 2 dawned cold and with the possibility of snow (finally!), so once on the slopes we got the new group one, which now included some of the most improved skiers from the beginners' groups, up the mountain and the rest over to the nursery slopes to work more on their technique. There were still too many that we thought might struggle with parts of the main runs, especially the final common run-in, to take a full group up as it would have left too large a group with the remaining instructor. Nicolas did ask his boss if anyone else was available, but with so many school groups out at the same time from several different countries, there was nobody. By late morning the snow was absolutely chucking it down (great for the resort, not great to ski through) so although the top group were able to manage the mountain, including a timed slalom run, the visibility was terrible, the snow was slushy and the common run was a mogul field, so we kept groups 2 and 3 at the bottom. Not ideal but better than having their first run be a disaster and knocking their confidence.

Once we got back to the hotel after shopping in Altenmarkt (leaving the local Spar depleted of Haribo and e-numbers), we decided that evening to change venues and go to Flachauwinkle for Day 3, since the conditions were constantly ruling out our usual Cruzey Blue introductory run.





Flachauwinkle did turn out to be a good choice, since there was a long nursery slope with a drag lift to do warm ups, and then a "family run" that snaked down the mountain from top to bottom through the woods. Not necessarily great for experienced skiers as it did involve a lot of snowploughing, but it worked really well for the beginnners' groups to get their first taste of real pistes.

By the end of the day, despite some rather variable weather, everyone had completed several runs down, and were definitely ready for an area with a greater variety of challenges.

So...Flachau for Days 4-6 then.



Day 4 saw a very tired mixture of tutus, bananas, witches, prison escapees and many more heading up to the slopes. Good effort people! The bright green alien abducting Jo our instructor especially caused no end of laughs and camera clicks from other skiers - also very helpful to spot your group on the slopes! Thankfully the weather behaved itself and everyone had a really productive day, skiing around all the different slopes Flachau has to offer, including the infamous path leading from the café onto the main slope. The beginner's groups even took on some red slopes without there being carnage, so well done them and their instructors. As a result of the high temperatures, the bottom of the mountain was basically one big Slush Puppy, but we kept everyone running top to middle, rinse and repeat. You can see from the panorama photo that the valley is basically a sea of green with small strips of white where the ski resorts have manufactured snow. Some resorts across Europe were completely shut due to lack of snow and temperatures too high to run snow canons, so we couldn't complain too much. There were long queues to get the gondola down though - few people wanted to ski to bottom.


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We were back at Flachau in the evening for the ever popular Lucky Flitzer – the alpine rollercoaster. Students could see the bottom part of it from the gondola, but going by their screams they hadn't realised just how far up the mountain, and just how fast, it goes. Everyone was eager for their second go however, and the feedback we got was that it was one of the highlights of the trip.

Days 5 and 6 were basically more skiing around Flachau, without the costumes but with increasing degrees of skill and confidence. Day 6 did however win the competition for "how much snow can one resort get in a day". It literally didn't stop for a second during the day or night, and certainly made the made the beginning of the journey home "fun!"

We would just like to thank everyone once again for making Ski Notley 2024 what we hope was a success. The ski company SET, the coach company and their drivers, the hotel staff, our wonderful instructors (especially Lily Brown who stepped in as Head Ski Guide at the last minute and did an exemplary job), and our amazing school staff and their partners who generously allowed them to come, all the parents and carers...and most of all the students.

On the Sunday after we returned from the 2024 Ski Trip, we received the devastating news that our friend and long-term Ski Notley instructor Will Myers had passed away after a short illness. Will was a huge part of Ski Notley over the best part of the last decade. Anyone who knew him and were taught by him will know just how big.

In 2015, Dave and Jen, our other long-term ski guides, were looking for another person to help with our annual school trip, and recommended their colleague Will. "Are you sure he will fit in?" we asked. "Absolutely" was the reply. So...Will came on board. Right from the off, he was the missing jigsaw piece for our puzzle.

Will knew more about skiing than most of us will ever learn. More importantly, he knew how to pass his knowledge on to our students. That's not a given. Plenty of top-class skiers have no clue how to teach. Will had that gift. Well over a hundred of our students owe their "ski legs" to Will.

He should have been skiing with us this year. He should have been coaching the beginners in their initial tentative runs, and watching them blossom over the week into confident, proficient skiers through his advice and guidance. Like he always did. He was an awesome coach. And I don't use that word lightly. But the universe intervened. We learned that he had pulled out from the trip just a few short days before we were supposed to leave. We knew he must have been ill to not come with us – he had been asking me about the trip for almost a year – but we didn't know how ill.

Will passed away while we were on the trip.

Personally, I will miss his presence. I will miss him skiing past my camera, asking to see the photos, and then bemoaning his own technique. It was always great. It was never good enough for him. I genuinely hope that wherever he is, the powder is deep, the pistes are freshly prepared, and he has all the time he needs to get his knees that little bit closer to the floor in the turns. Just one more run...

With the blessing of his family, we have instituted the Will Myers Award in his memory, to be given to the most outstanding student on each ski trip. That can mean anything – skiing ability, progress, resilience, kindness – whatever makes them really stand out.

This year, the award is presented to Rhiannon Foster in Year 11. Miss Trafford said it best. "She is wonderfully kind, helping people throughout the trip, both on the slopes and off them. She was in the top group but was never cocky or arrogant about it and was always supportive of others." That sums up perfectly what Will was like as an instructor. Kind, helpful, supportive, skilful but never arrogant. And by coincidence Rhiannon was taught by Will in 2020.

From Lily, our Head Ski Guide "I was really impressed with her skiing when I skied with top group. You would never think she had only had 1 week on snow before! Will did good". He did. He always did.

We hope he would approve.

Cambodia is our second World
Challenge adventure, and this has
been offered our current year 9 and
10 students. This is a thirteen night
expedition, and students will contribute
to elephant conservation, explore Kulen
Mountain and experience Angkor Wat.
Students will touch down in the cultural
city of Phnom Penh. They've made it to
Cambodia! Cambodia is the home of the
historic Khmer Empire and the mighty
Mekong River.

After their arrival students will wake up to the bright colours of Phnom Penh and jump into expedition life. They will meet the ground team, get to grips with the currency (Cambodian riel) and head out to buy a SIM card for the team phone.

Once these initial jobs are completed, it will be time to explore. The team will navigate the buzzing streets and grab their first glimpses of the city's French colonial architecture and ornate temples. They will also seek out some tasty Khmer cuisine – think fish curry, beef stir fry and mango salad. Students will find out about the Khmer Rouge regime and Cambodia's tragic history - it's a disturbing but important story and will visit the Tuol Sleng Genocide Museum this former school was a torture centre. where more than 20,000 people were held. They will then continue to the Choeung Ek Memorial, where the stupa contains thousands of human skulls. This is the site of the killing fields.

On day three, students will take a day trip south of the city (a 90-minute drive) to a special sanctuary for endangered sun bears, saved from the illegal wildlife trade. They will meet the keepers and help out with conservation work – this could involve anything from cleaning the bear dens to preparing food. They'll also see gibbons swinging through the trees and meet other protected animals. This is a rare chance to get up close with Cambodian wildlife.

Unlike Borneo, the Cambodia expedition completes their project before their trek and their project is at an elephant conservation centre.



First, they'll travel to the capital of Mondulkhiri province. After a night in the town, it's a short trip to the sanctuary (30mins). The first of its kind in Cambodia, the sanctuary rescues elephants from harmful tourist activities, like elephant riding, and helps to rehabilitate them. Students will meet the conservation experts, learn about the elephants' stories and find out how they're nursed back to health. Students will then follow their guide into the forest and look for the herd - who should be grazing in the clearing. Students will observe the elephants, and follow them on foot and learn more about their forest home. Next, they'll join the staff to help keep the sanctuary running - lend a hand with reforestation, have a go at banana harvesting and help out with maintenance work at the basecamp.

Students will then, for the next two days, travel to the cultural city of Siem Reap. They will have a whole day to explore Cambodia's coolest little city. Siem Reap is the gateway to Angkor Wat, but there's loads more to discover here. You could start by exploring the town's riverside walkways, then hit the markets for souvenirs and noodle salads. Another option is to book a boat or kayak trip on Tonle Sap Lake – the largest freshwater lake in Southeast Asia.

The explorers will then partake in a beautiful trek, which will last over three days. They will tackle Cambodia's most sacred mountain range, where Jayavarman II is said to have founded the Khmer

Empire. The team will also meet with their local guides and cooks. They're insanely experienced, and students will listen to their stories and learn everything you can from these mountain masters. They will travel to the start point at the base of Kulen Mountain and set off past villages, waterfalls and bat-filled caves. Each student will take a turn in leading trek and they explore deeper into the forest. Along the way, they'll discover the Beng Mealea temple ruin, the Sras Damrei elephant shrine, and a huge reclining Buddha. At night, students will pitch their tents, chat with their guides and help out with the cooking. After three days of trekking, they will most probably crash out on the journey back to Siem Reap.

On the final day, they will be in Angkor Wat. Students will 'time-travel' to the greatest city of the Khmer Empire. Siem Reap sits right next to the famous Angkor temples – and will get to watch the sun rise over this mind-blowing complex. Angkor Wat is just incredible, and you may recognise Ta Prohm temple from the Tomb Raider movie. There's also the Terrace of the Elephants, Palace of the Leper Kings and 54 towers of the Bayon Temple to discover. On their final night in Cambodia, they will have a celebratory meal. They will tuck into their favourite Khmer cuisine, share their best memories and set their friendships in stone.

About Sir Jack Petchey CBE

Jack Sir Jack is an incredible inspiration to everyone who works at the Foundation. Even at 98 he takes an active interest in the running of the charity, as do the rest of his family who share his vision.

He was born into a working class family in the East End in 1925, left school at 13 and then joined the Navy in 1943. After leaving the Navy, he began working as a clerk for a solicitor's firm. He applied for management training but was told he would never make a businessman.

Instead of giving up, Sir Jack used the £39 he was given from the Navy to buy a second hand

car and started a taxi business. Through hard work and innovative thinking, he proved them wrong and built a multi-million-pound empire.

Sir Jack's experiences led to his passion to increase young peoples' aspirations by rewarding their achievements. In 2016, Sir Jack received his knighthood in recognition of his many years of charitable work.

This academic year, Notley High School is celebrating the 'Year of Number', and students are completing challenges related to number in their form groups. The Autumn term was very successful, please see some quotes from students.

This term they have been completing more 'Year of Number' challenges. 

On Sunday the 3rd and Monday the 4th of March, some Year 12 students attended Felsted School's annual Model United Nations Conference. The event is a chance for schools, colleges and sixth forms across the whole county to come together and use their debating, critical thinking, and persuasion skills to draft policies that, if real, could change the world!

The conference started with an opening ceremony, where delegations gathered together and were welcomed onto a replica of the stage of world politics. After that, delegates went to their individual committee meetings to start discussion of the fast-track resolutions – resolutions that had been preselected by the Chairs to start the conference off to a swift start. This continued throughout the first day, with delegates voting on resolutions and to amend and add their own clauses to policies.

The second day was where committees started to join, to have an ad-hoc debate, where the congregation constructed a resolution, clause after clause, different to before where the resolutions had already been drafted. Countries worked together to tackle world pressing issues, such as vaccination and child health.

Some of our students representing New Zealand formed alliances between them, the UK and Canada, imitating the proposed CANZUK alliance in the real world too and those representing Sri Lanka were valuable cosigners on resolutions.

Our students also made resolutions and amendments of their own, and then had to defend them in front of the whole committee. Although it was a daunting task at the start, by the end of the conference students had gained confidence and were able to advocate for their clauses.

Then, a crisis was introduced. The scenario was that China had launched cyber-attacks on Taiwan. Delegations scrambled over a working lunch to draft more resolutions to combat this issue – with a collaborative spirit to resolve what could have been a severe problem if it were real. After a heated session, the conference was over. Following the closing ceremony we reflected on the events on the two days, and the charity being supported over the conference, Magic Bus, which enhances education for children that are most in need.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable experience, and students are looking forward to next year, if the opportunity arises again! Thank you to Mr Buttle and Mrs Townsend for going with us and facilitating the whole trip!

Year 7 & 8 Passion Projects


