# **Years12&13**

As we near the end of the first term, it gives me the opportunity to reflect back on what has been a busy but productive and enjoyable term.

Year 12 have now completed the first term of their post-16 studies and the sixth form team have been very impressed by their engagement and enthusiasm towards their academic studies as well as how they have always been willing to put themselves forward for opportunities when they arise. We have a number of Year 12 students supporting students in the main school, either as a Reading Buddy, an Academic Mentor or as a Student Teaching Assistant in the classroom. For some of our main school students, the impact the sixth former is having on their learning experience is vital and incredibly positive, and therefore we want to take this opportunity to thank all of those students that are in these positions. Staff have also been nominating students in Year 12 as Subject Ambassadors and these have been celebrated in our end of term assembly. Students have all been assigned their first academic reading book which supports their subject choices and many have been reading these with earnest. Academic reading is linked to the development of critical thinking, an important skill in many of the subjects studied in the sixth form.

Year 12 have also all had their mock interviews this term with outside employers and prepared for this by writing a letter of application. The interviews were incredibly successful and some students impressed employers so much, they have been asked to complete work experience with them.

Year 13 students have started the year by setting their sights on the summer exams and what they need to achieve to take their next steps beyond the sixth form. UCAS applications are currently being submitted and the students have been visiting universities and considering different courses in order to ensure this process is successful. Many have already started receiving unconditional and conditional offers back from their chosen university courses. The mock exams will be returned in January and will give the students more information about what they need to do to ensure they achieve the grade they have the potential for and beyond. Support for apprenticeships will begin in the new year as live applications become available.



course too, with trainees doing just two days a week in their school and one day Core training at Notley. This course takes up to two years to complete.

To be eligible to train, all candidates must have a GCSE in Maths and English (or equivalent qualification) and a degree, too. But you do not have to teach the same subject as your degree. You just have to be passionate about your teaching subject and believe that you could be an inspiring role model for the next generation.





Over the summer holidays some of the current year 7's visited our Forest School site during Summer Camp making shelters, relaxing in hammocks, making rope swings and roasting marshmallows on the fire. It was a great way to make memories with new friends ahead of starting at Notley.

We have been lucky to have been in touch with a couple of tree surgeons, one who had removed a willow tree at Marshall's Park. Some of the tree was shredded so we can refresh our paths, and some was chopped into logs that will be used for future projects. We have also received some hazel branches which we have made into bow and arrows, wind chimes and are currently into whittling into gnomes.

We have been thinking about sustainability on our site by:

- making our own compost from green clippings which we are using to fill our vegetable planters
- using the leaves collected by the school's grounds maintenance company to add to the dead hedge we have been making from

fallen branches which creates habitats and shelter for our wildlife visitors

- using branches from last year's Christmas tree as fuel to help light fires with
- collecting seasonal resources to be stored and used throughout the year like conkers, helicopter seeds, acorns, acorn cups, seed heads
- taking cuttings from donated willow branches so we can grow our own willow trees providing us with resources for making with in the near future so we are self sufficient

Lots of new activities have been tried this term including making fairies using dried seed heads, drilling and threading conkers to make a necklace, making a mallet and a dumbbell from willow branches, and Christmas tree decorations.

We have been visited and sung to frequently by a robin who has been named Tobias, as well as spotting a variety of different species of birds.

Site improvements include some new gates donated by a former parent making our site more secure, removing dead branches from trees, and increasing the size of our compost bin. Next on the list of things to do is to create a permanent shelter over the fire circle so we can continue to practise our lighting and maintaining fire skills when it's raining or sunny!




Over 12 days, the team immersed themselves in the vibrant culture, breathtaking landscapes, and unique challenges of the Malaysian jungle.




Students were thrilled to spot starfish, pufferfish, and even a shark during their underwater adventure.



These achievements are a testament to our students' hard work and determination, as well as the unwavering support from their teacher.


