Culture and Ethos

We have now developed year group zones for the start of the day and morning registration. Each year group have their own allocated zone where they are met by their Raising Standards Leader, Pastoral Manager and a designated member of the Senior Leadership team. This provides the opportunity

for collaboration amongst students and staff within the year group and creates a positive and cohesive start to the day. Students will be able to take responsibility for their areas, have support available, receive interventions and pastoral sessions as well as have resources such as lockers all close by.

Students Voice/ The Notley Way

As a school we have reviewed the school ethos and values of what we want from all our Notley students. Working with our school council, prefects, senior prefects and sixth form prefect team, the students discussed and evaluated what they felt needed to be improved and developed suggestions for designs that showed unity between the Sixth Form and the main school.

Students with leadership responsibilities within the school and sixth form came together at a student voice conference to discuss and develop the Notley way and our new strapline.

Tutor groups then had the opportunity to vote on their favourite option.

Students also had the opportunity to get involved in designing a new badge. The designs were put to the students during tutor time and the outright winner was the design that still incorporated the tree but with added House colours as the roots and shows Braintree Sixth Form and Notley as one whole Community. The design will be used as the basis for the final badge. This badge will not be rolled out until 2023 for the new cohort and I do not expect this new badge to have to replace the one students

already have. If students do wish to then of course this can happen. The new logo will however be on our school branding moving forward. I would like to say a massive thank you to Charlie and Kyron who have taken all of the students' ideas to create the final design.



Trust Community Award

We are excited and proud to be launching the 'Bridge Academy Trust Community Award' from September. The aim of the award is to:

- Promote our core values of 'community' in our school and locally
- Celebrate community work
- Elevate the importance of community.

Children who complete community spirited tasks will receive badges and recognition as each level is completed.

I am delighted to announce that Mr Musson and Mrs Francis are our two new Community Ambassadors for this award.

Teaching and Learning roundup

This year, we have been focusing as a school on checking for students' understanding of their learning. For us as teachers, that means we have been using a range of questioning techniques to ensure we speak to every student in the class through the lesson, and we use a range of ways to gather opinions and answers - for example: mini whiteboards, think/pair/share, exit tickets. We have also made sure that there is recall and retrieval in every lesson to build students' confidence with remembering information and committing it to their long-term memory. Next year, this will become even more important as we move to exam weeks for the whole school.

More information will be sent to parents and students about this in September, but one important reason for this is to allow students to practise the key skills of exam preparation and rehearsing effective ways of revising.

Next year, we will also be continuing to focus on checking for understanding, making sure that we know where our students are, and that we are adjusting and adapting our lessons to deal with any misconceptions or gaps in knowledge. Reading with fluency will also be a focus, and students will have key vocabulary to learn to ensure they can access their lessons effectively.

Interventions and Catch-up

This half term, there have been some exciting activities happening during tutor time to boost progress in each year group, and the students should be proud of their commitment to improving themselves at every given opportunity.

Some of our year 7 students have been part of a trial looking at improving their literacy skills with an online programme called Lexia, and some other year 8 and 9 have been working on it in lesson time. Their dedication and hard work – and their enthusiasm – has led to 2.6 months improvement in their word recognition, grammatical skills and comprehension in just 4 weeks.

Some of our year 7 and 8 students have also been involved in our Reading Buddies programme, where they read with our year 9 and 10 students in the library. Previously, the students involved in this programme made on average an 11.8 month gain in their reading age in just over 3 months. We are hoping for similar results this time around but, just as importantly, the students have had the chance to get to know some of the wonderful students that Notley have that are not in their own year group.

Our year 10s have also begun to work with our sixth

form Subject Ambassadors for academic mentoring once a week. The year 12s have met one to one with some of our more able students in the library to address any concerns they have with the structure of exam questions, the content of the papers or issues the year 10 students may have around ways of revising. This will continue into year 11 as the students have really begun to bond. It has been a real pleasure to see the students working together so well and both groups of students growing in confidence as the sessions have gone on. The year 10s have all commented on how useful it has been to speak to and work with students who have just gone through their exams and therefore trialled all the best approaches to pass on.

We have also had a range of Maths and Science sessions taking place in the mornings and after school to help ensure that everyone is where they need to be at the end of the academic year as part of our catch-up post Covid strategy.

Our morning interventions, and a range of others, will continue into the new academic year to give as many students as possible the confidence to achieve greatness within their qualifications at Notley High School.

Homework and 'flipped learning'

Next year, we have signed up for all students to take part in Seneca Premium, an online learning platform that helps students to recall and retrieve information across the whole curriculum. As part of their homework, and some of their classwork, students will be set tasks relating to their learning in lessons to consolidate what they have done and to help embed this into their long-term memory. Students may be asked to complete some of these tasks as 'flipped learning' – a way of students learning some

of the key information prior to the lessons so they are able to access the subject in a different way.

Any tasks that students are set for homework will appear on their Arbor as an assignment, which you as parents can also see. All other homework will also be on there so you can help when they need it and jog them to remember their deadlines! Some tasks may be set on their class Teams page, but this will always be signposted on Arbor as well.

Learning Journeys





It was so so interesting slowly seeing how these physical theatre pieces are constructed and performed, and gave really effective insight on what different options we had for future projects.

We look forward to congratulating the students further at the Jack Petchey awards evening where they will receive their medallion and gain the recognition, they all deserve.





We have had some lovely spring flowers emerge from the bulbs planted in the autumn term. The trees blossomed beautifully and now have an abundance of apples and pears growing on them ready for picking in September. We've spotted ladybirds, butterflies, bees, and other insects basking in the sun and enjoying the flowers.

Much of our time has been spent preparing the vegetable beds for planting and cutting back brambles to access more fruit trees. Nature has ensured that we are always busy by continually growing back the brambles, weeds, and grass when we look the other way! Thankfully, we now have a strimmer so can spend less time pulling up the grass and more time learning about and enjoying the outdoor environment.





We have placed a plaque with some of the fruit trees planted in the English courtyard as part of The Queen's Canopy (queensgreencanopy.org). The plaque was purchased from the proceeds of the Library's Jubilee Bake Off cake sale.

We are very pleased to find lots of wildlife using our pond. We've investigated some of the smaller species in the water by pond dipping and examined the water under a microscope (exciting until we realised they were water fleas and mosquito larvae!). We are really thrilled to have found lots of newts and frogs in the pond, so we know that it was a much needed addition to the area.

The Orchard is proving to be a valuable resource for us to find out about the wildlife and nature around us, as well as a calming environment to relax and escape the pressures of tests and exams for all year groups.

The Football Development Coach will be based at Notley High School/Braintree Sixth Form and will be responsible for overseeing the new Sixth Form Football Development Programme, alongside creating and supporting links with local Primary schools.

The Tottenham Hotspur coach will also work closely across the school and will support the delivery of the extra-curricular sports programme to students in Years 7-11. The aim of this is to develop not only the overall ability of our students, but also to engage students with the true values and life skills of sport.

The Sixth Form programme will allow students to continue their studies within sport alongside developing their practical ability. The link with Tottenham Hotspur will give students the prospect to continue their studies into further education alongside the club itself and the opportunity of pursuing a career within the football industry.

The main aims of the partnership with Tottenham Hotspur are to provide all students, current and future, a clear development pathway from the age of 11 to 19 through sport. There is the opportunity and desire to grow and expand, including a unique Girls Football Development Centre (September 2023). Dawson, a current Tottenham Hotspur Ambassador, said: "The opportunity to work with our fantastic coaches to not only develop their game but potentially progress into a career in football is something the young people of Braintree can be extremely excited about.

"It was great to meet students at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form today – their passion for football is evident and I'm sure there are many more young people in the area who can benefit from this new partnership."
