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PDT CURRICULUM CONTENT FOR SUMMER TERM 2

As a part of your child's education at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form, we promote personal wellbeing and development through a comprehensive Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education programme delivered in PDT lessons. PSHE education is the curriculum subject that gives young people the knowledge, understanding, attitudes and practical skills to live safe, healthy, productive lives and meet their full potential.

The curriculum overview for PDT lessons during Summer term 2 is as follows:

Year 7

Citizenship: Migration and immigration, including refugees and asylum seekers. **Skills for Success:** Reflection of year 7 and preparing for year 8. **Relationships and staying safe:** Managing changing friendship groups. Personal safety when becoming more independent.

Year 8

Relationships and staying safe: Unhealthy relationships including within families and gangs. County lines, grooming, exploitation, and coercion, abuse, and harassment. Where to access support. Citizenship: The work of charities and the role of volunteers. Skills for Success: Reflection of year 8 and preparing for year 9.

Year 9

Relationships: Prejudice and misogyny **Finance:** What an economy is and how it influences financial decision making. Ethical consumerism. **Skills for Success:** Reflection of year 9 and preparing for year 10.

Year 10

Physical Health and Mental Wellbeing: Managing change, and coping with loss, grief and Bereavement. Organ and tissue donation.

Staying safe: The effect of alcohol and drugs on the individual, community, and society. Managing peer influence in increasingly independent contexts. Where to access support.
