## French Exchange



This year 18 students from Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form are taking part in the French Exchange with College Pablo Picasso, Toulouse. This is the 6th year of the exchange and week one, 14 - 20 April, was very successful.

As always, students were nervous as they waited for the French students to arrive on Sunday morning (in some cases it was the first time I had seen them so quiet!) However, it didn't take long for them to get to know each other and bond over music, food, football, video games and more.

The French students do not wear school uniform, have assemblies or study drama so spending two days in an English school was an interesting experience for them. They attended lessons and assembly and particularly enjoyed Miss White's drama workshop.

The weather was great and all students enjoyed punting and shopping in Cambridge. On Thursday we had a sightseeing tour of London followed by more retail therapy in Covent Garden. Both nationalities showed off their moves at the disco that night (the Harlem Shake was particularly impressive) and we have been promised a repeat performance in France! In addition to school activities, students and their families organised to meet up in the evenings which allowed the French students to get together with their friends from home.

The students should be very proud of themselves for being great hosts to their French visitors, using their language skills and persevering when communication was difficult. Much has already been learnt from their experience. One student was surprised to find out that he was quite good at French! Another is proud of herself for taking part despite her nerves and is pleased at how much she has in common with her exchange partner. Several students have commented that they have made good friends with their visitors and have been keeping in contact via email and Facebook.

Many thanks to all the families who took part and to the staff who helped with the trips and activities. We are now looking forward to staying with the French students in sunny Toulouse on 18 - 25 May.

### Year 7 Vocal Workshop with Essex Music Services

On 16 April 2013, Janette, from Essex Music Services, came to Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form to do a vocal workshop with Year 7. She introduced herself and said that today we would be learning 4 new catchy songs.

Further on in the song we were singing about shadow play and how much fun it was.

The third song was very special because Janette learnt this in Africa. It was a bit strange to start off with, because there were no words. Instead of words we used a variety of different sounds made by our mouths. After we got the hang of it we were also doing this song in rounds, it was quite hard because of the other group making the same sounds as you but at a different time.

## Working in partnership with the Braintree primary and secondary schools

The TANGO partnership are a group of teachers from primary and secondary schools who aim to provide extension and enrichment activities for our most able and talented students within the Braintree area. Every term we run a variety of masterclasses giving students the opportunity to extend their knowedge beyond what is learnt in the classroom. Below are some examples of the activities that have taken place during the spring term.

### **Maths Challenge**

On Thursday 25 April, 10 students from Years 7, 8 and 9 were invited to participate in a Maths Day at New Rickstones Academy in Witham, organised by The Millennium Project.

The day consisted of lateral thinking and mathematical challenges which developed team building, logical reasoning and skills in thinking and communicating mathematical ideas.

Students were divided into teams of five and completed various challenges throughout the morning against teams from New Rickstones Academy and Maltings Academy. We ended the day with a maths quiz and I am very proud to announce that our Team 1 were the winners, receiving a cup and Team 2 were first runners up receiving individual medals.

### **Year 10 Macbeth Workshop**

We were delighted to welcome the Young Shakespeare Company to Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form at the end of last term, to launch Year 10 students' study of 'Macbeth' with a workshop for the whole year group.

Our student reviewer gives her verdict:

On 26 March I was sitting in the second row in the Braintree Arts Theatre, waiting for the production of Shakespeare to start. I was expecting it to be rather dull, since 'Macbeth' is an old play. However, when the production started, I was positively surprised by the inventive, engaging way in which the drama group presented it.

Once the drama group had introduced themselves, they informed us how the workshop was going to work. They showed us various ways of how the play could be adapted to suit the actors' ideas and the modern world, for example instead of a war in Scotland, it could be set in modern day Afghanistan; as long as the lines and storyline remained the same, anything else could be modified. This concept was then demonstrated when the audience got to choose the traits of the characters, resulting in a Superman Macbeth and an orphan-baby murderer Lady Macbeth!

The key message, however, was that the audience must be able to follow and understand the play; if not, they'll end up confused, and probably demanding a refund! After investigating several character personalities and exploring features of Shakespearean plays, a satiated audience had to leave the theatre. The production had taught us not only about the story of Macbeth, but also that Shakespeare can be interesting, compelling and engaging – quite the opposite of our previous assumptions!

### Parent/Carer Forum - Marking and Assessment

On 2 May 2013, the inaugural meeting of the Marking and Assessment Parent/Carer Forum was held in Braintree Sixth Form. A select group of invited volunteer parents and carers from across the school, representing students in all year groups from 7 to 12, got together to discuss marking and assessment at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form and to offer a home perspective of that topic to the staff at the meeting. Nick Vosper and Tom Baster, Assistant Headteachers, who have been leading on this whole-school project this year, outlined the reasons for needing to improve this aspect of our practice stemming from recommendations made by Ofsted at previous inspections. They shared the journey that the school has undertaken this



year in Marking and Assessment, moving from redrafting the whole-school Marking and Assessment Policy to working with Faculties to ensure that each has a workable policy which is being rigorously implemented. Parents and Carers at the meeting were able to give a valuable insight into what matters to students, parents and carers with respect to marking and assessment, compared to how teachers view the subject and any statutory requirements which also may be brought to bear; subjects such as grades and levels and how easy these are to understand as well as the frequency with which books are marked were robustly discussed. The Forum will meet again in June when it will form a component of the Whole-School Marking and Assessment Review which is aimed to monitor the effectiveness of our new strategies in this area. The review will include support from outside experts as well as monitoring from within the school and will provide a snapshot of the health of Marking and Assessment at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form. The School wishes to thank all the parents/carers who gave up their time to attend and helped to drive this important project forwards.






