



Sir Jack Petchey CBE

About Sir Jack Petchey CBE

Sir Jack was born into a poor working class family in the East End in 1925. He left school with no qualifications when he was 13. He joined the Navy's Fleet Air Arm in 1943 during the Second World War. When he applied for Officer training he was unsuccessful. On discharge from the Navy Sir Jack began working as a clerk for the Solicitor's Law Stationary Society. He applied for management training there and was told he'd never make a businessman!



However he refused to give up! Investing his £39 discharge gratuity from the Navy, he bought his first second hand car and started a taxi business. Sir Jack worked long and hard, overcoming adversity and going on to become a multi-millionaire through his various business ventures, which have spanned from motor car dealing and garages to property, travel and investment.

Since establishing the Jack Petchey Foundation in 1999, his businesses have given £100 million to support youth projects. What he 'gives' is greater than money though; the same entrepreneurial skills that he brought to his business have led to some really innovative schemes for young people.

Sir Jack seeks to increase young people's aspirations by rewarding their achievements and encouraging them to take pride in them. He focuses on the positives rather than highlighting the negatives. More than anything Sir Jack believes that people should think of others and give back to society, no matter how small an act of kindness or generosity, he wants young people to know that in giving, you also receive and the world is a better place for it!



This emphasis on positive affirmation, self-belief, and the willingness to make an effort and to give to others are key to the development of the work of the Jack Petchey Foundation.





Did you know that the Jack Petchey Foundation supports hundreds of programmes across London and Essex—here is a spotlight on just three:

Jack Petchey's "SPEAK OUT" Challenge! The Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge, run in partnership with Speaker's Trust, believes everybody should have the skills, confidence and desire to speak in public, and are dedicated to helping young people achieve this.

Jack Petchey's "Speak Out" Challenge! is the biggest public speaking event of its kind in the world. Now in its 8th year, over 99,000 year 10 students have been trained from 500 state schools across London and Essex, leading to 37 yearly regional finals. Those winners are short listed to 15 invited to take part in the Grand Final.

Panathlon aims to offer sporting opportunities to severely disabled young people in London and Essex that don't have access to any other competitive sporting opportunities either at school or in clubs. Over 1500 young people a year currently participate in events across London and Essex. All 32 London Boroughs take part.

As well as offering sporting opportunity, Panathlon also train 250 young people a year to become Young Leaders. These Young Leaders play a crucial role in the Panathlon sporting events.

Step into Dance, run in partnership with the Royal Academy of Dance, delivers up to two hours of dance classes per week in 200 schools, throughout 30 weeks of the academic year. There are 5,875 students on the programme and 110 Step into Dance teachers. The project runs in 32 London Boroughs plus Essex.

About the Achievement Award Scheme



The Achievement Award Scheme is a reward and recognition initiative which enables schools and youth organisations to celebrate the achievements of their young people as well as receive additional funding.

The Achievement Award runs in almost 2,000 schemes across 1,500 organisations. Each year at least 12,500 young people receive an Achievement Award for their efforts. So far this year we have approved almost £2,400,000 worth of funding to grass roots projects through this programme.

The Jack Petchey Achievement Award Scheme is at the heart of the Foundation's work. Achievement Awards are given to young people who make a wholehearted, unselfish and dedicated contribution to their club, school or community. Each award attracts a grant of £250—a major part of the award-

is that the winner decides how that money should be spent in their school, club or organisation.

Jack Petchey Leader Awards are given to adults who have demonstrated, in an outstanding way, an ability to encourage and motivate young people aged 11-25 years. The award is open to youth workers, school teachers, community leaders, voluntary workers, sports coaches and any other adult who has regular contact with young people. Receiving a Leader Award opens up the opportunity of the winner applying for a grant from our small grants programme.



Widespread Celebrations for Young Achievers

Although we run and support a range of programs at the Foundation, our Achievement Award scheme remains at the core of our work. 2016 has seen us accept lots of new schools and clubs onto the scheme, and celebrate the achievements of more young people at our prestigious celebration events across London and Essex!

A big part of the events are the performers who grace us with their talents on the stage. Our events are great opportunities for young people to showcase their talents, and many go on to perform at multiple Jack Petchey Foundation events or talent shows across the country.

One of our young performers, Ashley Singh, is an innovative guitarist who attends the East London Arts and Music Academy. Ashley has wowed crowds at our events since first performing for us at the Newham celebration event back in June 2014. Ashley's Talent is grabbing the attention of everyone who see's him. He performed at the Speakout Challenge Grand Final at the Piccadilly Theatre.



We are sure that Ashley will go on to have a very successful performing career.
